Welcome from INTERPOL

On behalf of INTERPOL, it is my pleasure to welcome you to Hong Kong for the 2010 International Law Enforcement Intellectual Property Crime Conference. I would like to thank Hong Kong Customs for co-hosting this important event, Underwriters Laboratories for their generous support and the sponsor organizations for their staunch commitment towards tackling transnational organized Intellectual Property (IP) crime.

Fighting intellectual property crime stretches beyond law enforcement agencies, and an effective campaign requires cross-sector co-operation at all levels. The need to work together at regional and global level was highlighted at all three of our previous conferences, held in Canada and Ireland. This necessity has not diminished; on the contrary, it is greater than before.

For this reason, Hong Kong was chosen to be the first Asian venue for this important conference. With so many IP crime specialists crime converging at the conference, I encourage all participants to take the opportunity to network with like-minded colleagues, learn what works and how proven techniques elsewhere can be deployed effectively to break organized crime in one's operating environment.

Innovative and successful investigative practices identified at our earlier conferences have been adopted and integrated into the INTERPOL IP crime programme. This has enabled us to link all regions of the world together and harness collective efforts to tackle transnational organized IP crime on a global level.

For example, in 2010, the integrated IP crime training and operational deployment model was deployed in Africa, Europe, North East Asia and the Americas. By the end of August, Operation Jupiter, coordinated and facilitated by INTERPOL in partnership with World Customs Organisation (WCO), and deployed throughout South America, had led to over 170 police and customs operational interventions. These interventions resulted in 424 arrests and the seizure of counterfeit and pirated product valued at over USD 50 Million.

Another exciting development is the production of Introductory Level training materials for the on-line International IP Crime Investigators College (IIPCIC). IIPCIC, delivered by INTERPOL in co-operation with UL University, will go live at the end of 2010 and provide all IP crime investigators with relevant and timely IP crime training. This is substantial progress as we can only break organized IP crime if police, customs, regulatory bodies and industry investigators are united with a common purpose and clear understanding of how collectively we can make a real difference.

You will have the opportunity to hear more about these and other exciting initiatives during this conference. I wish you an enriching conference, and an enjoyable stay in this vibrant and hospitable city.

On behalf of the Hong Kong Customs, it gives me great pleasure to welcome you to the 2010 International Law Enforcement Intellectual Property (IP) Crime Conference. The Honorable Ronald S.W. Lew

United States District Judge

Judge Ronald S.W. Lew was born in Los Angeles, the third of nine children. His father was a Chinese launderer who immigrated from Guangdong Province and operated the Mandarin Laundry in downtown Los Angeles. Judge Lew worked his way through school in his father's laundry business.

Upon graduation from Loyola University, Judge Lew commenced his study at Southwestern University School of Law. His legal education was interrupted by the draft. After serving as a First Lieutenant in the United States Army, he returned to Southwestern and was admitted to practice law in 1971. He worked as a deputy city attorney for two and a half years before going into the private practice of law.

While in the last year of law school, Judge Lew married Mamie (who was born in Guangdong, China) and started their family. Judge Lew enjoys sharing his free time with his four children, spouses and grandchildren.

Judge Lew has been involved in public service for a number of years. He was appointed by Mayor Tom Bradley to the Los Angeles Fire and Police Pension Commission which he served on from 1976 to 1982. He was first appointed as a judge by Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr. in 1982 to the Los Angeles Municipal Court. He was then elevated by Governor George Deukmejian in 1984 to Judge of the Los Angeles Superior Court.

On May 7, 1987, President Ronald Reagan appointed Judge Lew to the federal bench where he now serves in the Central District of California. He is the first Chinese-American appointed as a United States District Judge in the continental United States.

Always active in civic, community affairs, Judge Lew helped to establish the Chinatown Service Center, the Asian Pacific American Bar Association and the Southern California Chinese Lawyers Association. He is involved in a host of civic, community, church and legal activities, and currently sits on the following boards: The Chinese Heart Council; Southwestern School of Law; Friends of the Chinese American Museum; Federal Judges Association; the Federal Circuit Bar Association Judges Committee and the American Inns of Court.



The Honorable Eric H. Holder, Jr.Attorney General of the United States

Eric H. Holder Jr. was sworn in as the 82nd Attorney General of the United States on February 3, 2009 by Vice-President Joe Biden. President Barack Obama announced his intention to nominate Mr. Holder on December 1, 2008.

In 1997, Mr. Holder was named by President Clinton to be the Deputy Attorney General, the first African-American named to that post. Prior to that he served as U.S. Attorney for the District of Columbia. In 1988, Mr. Holder was nominated by President Reagan to become an Associate Judge of the Superior Court of the District of Columbia.

Mr. Holder, a native of New York City, attended public schools there, graduating from Stuyvesant High School where he earned a Regents Scholarship. He attended Columbia College, majored in American History, and graduated in 1973. He graduated from Columbia Law School in 1976.

While in law school, he clerked at the N.A.A.C.P. Legal Defense Fund and the Department of Justice's Criminal Division. Upon graduating, he moved to Washington and joined the Department of Justice as part of the Attorney General's Honors Program. He was assigned to the newly formed Public Integrity Section in 1976 and was tasked to investigate and prosecute official corruption on the local, state and federal levels.

Prior to becoming Attorney General, Mr. Holder was a litigation partner at Covington & Burling LLP in Washington.

Mr. Holder lives in Washington with his wife, Dr. Sharon Malone, a physician, and their three children.

United States Senate
Sergeant at Arms

Terrance W. Gainer was sworn in as the 38th United States Senate Sergeant at Arms in January 2007, continuing a distinguished career in law enforcement and security innovations worldwide. As chief law enforcement and executive officer of the Senate, the Sergeant at Arms enforces rules of the Senate, provides services to Senators in their Washington D.C. and state offices, and maintains security in the Capitol and Senate office buildings. He leads a force of nearly 1,000 personnel.

Mr. Gainer began his law enforcement career as a police officer in the Chicago Police Department and rose through the ranks, including many years as an experienced homicide detective. An accomplished attorney, Mr. Gainer served as chief legal officer of that department before he entered the Illinois State Government as Deputy Inspector General and Deputy Director of the Illinois State Police. He served at the

U.S. Department of Transportation as Special Assistant to the Secretary before being appointed as Director of the Illinois State Police.

In 1998, Mr. Gainer moved to Washington, D.C. where he served as Executive Assistant Chief of Police for the Metropolitan Police Department and four years later was selected to be the Chief of the U.S. Capitol Police. He then entered the private sector as a Chief Executive Officer responsible for a multimillion dollar innovative law enforcement program supporting military operations in Iraq and Afghanistan. The following year, the U.S. Senate appointed Mr. Gainer as the Senate Sergeant at Arms.

While serving as Sergeant at Arms, Mr. Gainer was appointed a Commissioner on the Independent Commission on the Security Forces of Iraq, charged with conducting an independent assessment of the Iraqi Security Forces and reporting the findings to Congress. He also served with the Special Envoy for Middle East Regional Security, which was created to advance the resolution of the Israeli-Palestinian dispute by assisting in strengthening security institutions.

Born in Chicago, Mr. Gainer is a decorated veteran who served in Viet Nam and retired as a Captain in the United States Navy Reserve. His degrees include a Bachelor's degree in Sociology, a Master of Science in Management, a Juris Doctor degree and an Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters. He is married and has six children and 14 grandchildren.
